PROMISING PROGRESS

Rays of Grace Junior School is located in Kirugu, Buikwe District. It enrolls 400+ pupils who are blessed to receive daily welfare, shelter and education.

On March 21 this year, Uganda reported its first case of COVID-19. A 36-year-old businessman from Kampala, Uganda's capital who had traveled to Dubai, United Arab Emirates (UAE) presented with fever and flu-like symptoms at Entebbe International Airport and his sample tested positive for COVID-19. This was the spark of the current situation in Uganda characterized by the unending lockdown which has affected all major institutions and sectors in the country. On the 18th of March 2020, even before the first COVID-19 case was reported, a presidential directive requiring all educational institutions to close was made in a bid to prevent the spread of the deadly virus disease which had become a global pandemic in the field of health.

With the pupils' learning put on hold for an undetermined duration, our mighty school Rays of Grace remained uncertain of when pupils' learning will resume, which has now continued around four (4) months since closure. The staff and pupils all went to their homes, except the security personnel who work full time providing security to the school. This meant that the majority of the stakeholders, especially the parents, who were deriving some

income from the school through supply of food items, providing casual labor and others services, were greatly affected. On visiting various vulnerable homes and some of our pupils who benefit from sponsorship, the situation was beyond description. They barely had anything to eat, lacked meeting of basic needs and had resorted to farming as a livelihood activity in the COVID era. We supplied around 8,800 pounds of maize flour, 3,000 pounds of rice, laundry soap, eggs, hand sanitizers and masks as a corporate social responsibility program to help the community people and pupils to survive. Thank you to our partner organization Hoffman Family Foundation USA for this campaign, which benefited many at-risk homes. For us to continue with community social corporate responsibility, we will need to raise more funds to support the children at home and the community at large. The first and second phase of the food relief program was a success.

Nevertheless, there was construction work in progress by the time the pupils were required to go home. Hoffman Family Foundation embarked on making the school better for students' learning. The nursery section inner and outer finishing was near completion, the kids' play area being worked on and the construction of a burglar perimeter fence and gate was in progress. We are happy to report that everything looks beautiful and favorable for pupils' learning.

School Fencing and Gate Construction

The growing concerns over safety have led many schools to consider implementation of new and more stringent security measures. The use of fencing to bolster school security as part of broader safety plans has become a key issue in discussion of school safety worldwide. A perimeter wall made of concrete blocks was constructed along the school territorial area. The front side of the school, starting from the teachers' quarters side and extending to the nursery section, was completed and electric conduits fitted for lighting during the nighttime. In addition, metallic burglar fence is to be fitted on the concrete perimeter wall to enable tight security. However, the back

side of the school up to the soccer field is still fitted with a temporary chain-link fence since the land in between the area soccer field and school has not been purchased and squatters still exist on it.

In addition to the school fencing, a metallic gate was successfully constructed and fitted on the front in order to provide an entrance and exit mechanism for the school visitors and pupils. The fence and gate are expected to deter crime, encourage child safety, enable surveillance by school staff, limit access to highly non-visible areas and restrict entry and exit points to a few easily monitored areas.

Compound Paving and Design

With the increasing number of child enrollment, we are to set up clear walkways and do compound paving in order to keep a clean and better school environment free from mud. In this regard, therefore, a stockpile of approximately 40,000 pavers has been made to be used in paving various areas at the school compound. In addition, trees which can grow to a reasonable height have been planted around the school to provide shade for the pupils and encourage a lush green environment.





The Permaculture Project

Before COVID, the school had set up a permaculture garden to supplement the pupils' welfare as well as serving as a demonstration farm for the science class where students can apply class theory to practical life in order to gain hands-on experience. They could learn transplanting, setting up a nursery bed, weeding, pruning and other science-related activities as well as learning how to use the various garden tools.

Currently, the whole project covers an approximated acre piece of land where vegetable foods like cornflower, cabbage, spinach, broccoli, cucumber, carrots, eggplant, papaya, onions, tomatoes, beetroot, coriander, sweet potatoes and others are planted. We believe this will be a good food security project and will supplement the pupils' and staff welfare very richly. We have started to see the benefits of

the hard work through the harvests made; and if our pupils were around, they would have had a good experience of "fresh veggies" from the garden.

We plan to continue with this project since what we have set up so far shows a promising start. We plan to also have the women empowerment groups visit the project on scheduled days to have experience and acquire life-changing skills as they plan to survive through agriculture as a livelihood activity.

There is a remarkable, steady progress; and the school can save more on welfare expenditures if it makes the little investment required to become more efficient.

Our Next Projects

We plan to make finishing touches on the earlier started projects. These include the following:

- Tiling the upper floor of the nursery section which is designated to be a dormitory for the girls and painting of the whole nursery block
- Roofing and finishing of the newly constructed canteen with the staff quarters extension made on the same block
- Make compound demarcations and paving of the whole school to maintain a clean and safe environment

Other long term projects

- Construction of a multi-purpose building to accommodate a school chapel as well as dining hall for the pupils
- Clearing the area near the staff quarters for paving in order to serve as a parking lot for the school visitors
- Acquiring more land, especially the one in the middle of the soccer field and the school, to allow expansion, and setting up mega projects like the school chapel
- Making an upgrade on the school soccer field to add a pavilion and other facilities that make up a model soccer complex

Conclusion

The unprecedented times of the COVID-19 era have created an unending impact on all spectrums of life. Political, socioeconomic and technological dimensions have all been affected by the deadly virus. As we pray for the situation to normalize, we should all be cautious on whatever we do going forward and have a "what if" question in all we plan to do in order to have a proactive approach on unplanned emergencies. We thank all stakeholders who have showed great concern during this period, and we pray for double blessings as we eagerly anticipate the Post-COVID era.

THE 20 COVID COMMANDMENTS

“Faith tells us that no matter what lies ahead of me, God is already there.”

A flurry of activity has finalized our new nursery block. We are eager for the school to reopen and our students to discover the new facility.

We were fortunate to acquire a trampoline which will be temporarily set up in the caged soccer field, on Astroturf for safety measures. This is in addition to the existing jungle gym which was set up before the lockdown and other pre-existing playground equipment.

As the world continues to suffer from COVID-19, the education sector has been greatly affected. Right from the 20th of March 2020, the Ministry of Education and Sports ordered all educational institutions be closed immediately. Many of us became concerned that we did not know what the impact would be. I must say I was a bit scared that there was going to be a mass death within the country.

God is so good all the time. You and I are still alive. We may not be where we want to be, but I strongly appreciate my life and your life.

As the country went into lockdown, a number of things went into pause. Two weeks down the road, we tried to learn how to follow the Ministry of Health standard operating procedures which we learned and managed to move on with life. There was much to be done at school in regard to infrastructure. The Ministry of Health has given procedures that educational institutions have to follow in case schools are opened up:

Handwashing

At Rays of Grace Junior Academy, we have plenty of water -- more than 20,000 liters in storage tanks with underground solar -powered pump to keep the tanks fully pumped. In addition to the handwashing station at the kitchen area, around the toilets and at the gate, we added movable non- touch washing stations throughout the school accessible points. I am positive that the kids will love this magic of using just the feet to dispense both soap and water to wash the hands with this facility.

One temperature monitor and 40 liters of hand sanitizer will be present in each classroom for every child to sanitize when leaving and returning. They will quickly adapt to the new way of life.

Observance of a two-meter distance between learners

Rays of Grace Junior Academy, being a young and growing institution in the District of Buikwe has been ranked one of the fastest growing educational institutions. Where many families barely afford two meals a day, children often miss the opportunity to attend school. This can be due to parents unable to afford to pay for schooling or a lack of school in the area.

Routine screening of learners and staff at critical control points for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 are the cost drivers which should be adequately prepared for.



We always look up to our GOD for His kind blessing as we initiate all the required standard operating procedures as listed below:

1. Maintain physical distance or social distance of at least two meters apart
2. Each class should have a student leader for COVID-19 cases assessment
3. Use of masks for all learners
4. Each school is expected to recruit a health assistant (nurse)
5. Teachers are required to enforce mandatory use of masks at educational institutions
6. Install handwashing equipment at all critical points
7. Full time trained personnel assigned to do temperature screening
8. A well-calibrated working temperature monitor to be provided at each entrance
9. Staff to complete and submit daily screening summary reports
10. Learners with above-normal temperatures are promptly isolated and the district task force to be immediately informed
11. Isolation room for suspected affected learners to be provided
12. A foot-operated handwashing machine to be available in each school
13. Handwashing supplies to be provided at schools, at all times
14. All learners, staff and visitors to keep social distance of two meters between persons during handwashing
15. Assign staff to supervise break periods and stagger releasing students for breaks, lunch and going home time to limit interaction
16. Students and staff must sit at least two meters apart in the classroom
17. Keep windows open
18. At the end of the day, disinfect all toilets, door handles, window seals, tables, blackboards and other surfaces using disinfectant
19. Avoid recreational and sports activities
20. Restrict entry into staff quarters

IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON WOMEN GROUPS

One of our core goals is to empower women so their families can thrive! This year, we chose two amazing women to lead our Women's Empowerment Program. Loretta and Sarah have been working with HFF since we began in 2015. Now, they are taking on the new role of training our women's groups on credit and financial management, conflict resolution, and counseling. We want to introduce you to Sarah and Loretta, our new Women's Empowerment Co-Directors!

The current COVID-19 crisis deeply impacts the genders differently. Women and girls bear the brunt of disproportionate care burdens, disruptions in income and education, poor access to health and other essential services, greater risk of being dispossessed of land and property. For women already living in poverty, these impacts can be a shock to their economic stability overall and impede their ability to purchase critical necessities, such as medicine, food and above all – their savings.

With the following objectives of:

- Assisting parents to manage consumption needs (including food), pay health services, school fees/materials
- Creating and strengthening livelihood by creating (income generating) opportunities through access to capital and personal loans, developing leadership skills and enhancing community participation
- Inspiring personal (individual) confidence and hope, creating structures that enhance a sense of ownership and accountability
- Strengthening and diversifying small businesses through international support or association to form new businesses

Hoffman Family Foundation (HFF) launched a program of Women's Empowerment in 2014; however, women's groups activities were heavily affected by the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic due to the Ministry of Health guidelines that were put in place to control the spread of the pandemic.

Challenges

The COVID-19 crisis and the resulting lockdown pose unique challenges for women's groups, but previous evidence from the government suggests that members within the women's groups should provide members with the mechanisms to cope with the crisis.

Lockdown particularly is challenging for women's groups because almost all groups meet physically. Even after easing of lockdown, social distancing and limitations to mobility policies hindered the ability of women's group members to meet. At the same time, existing evidence suggests that the social, human, and financial capital generated through women's groups may enable group members to mitigate the consequences of negative economic and health shocks.



After over 100 days, Government developed guidelines for easing of the lockdown:

- Transport, shops, hotels, and restaurants were allowed to operate following Ministry of Health standard operating procedures (SOPs) like social distancing and use of masks.
- Social distancing: This requires groups to change their functioning—for example, limiting physical meetings and possibly introducing virtual meetings and technology which members aren't conversant with and not affordable. This also compromises financial dual control method of avoiding risks of fraud.
- Economic shocks and social protection: Economic shocks may reduce income and viable market linkages for groups linked to livelihood promotion, which may ultimately result in group dissolution due to a lack of capital to invest and low savings.
- It was observed that most of them were farmers, drivers, hairdressers, retail sellers, butchers, Boda Boda riders, restaurants, food and clothes vending, etc.
- It was observed that farming activity was the most active during the lockdown. Families got so much engaged in Agriculture though they were also affected by high costs of inputs (fertilizers and pesticides), too much rain that affected the yields, poor market, difficulty in transportation of produce even after easing the lockdown.
- Cattle selling was also restricted due to foot and mouth disease that prompted the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Animal Husbandry to impose a ban slaughter of animals. Butchers and animal keepers were affected.
- Beauty parlors and restaurants remain closed to-date which is still affecting members in that line.
- Drivers and public transport owners are still affected despite easing on lockdown. For them that came with a lot of restrictions not limited to operating at half capacity, registering for routes, licensing, etc.
- Retail shops remained open but with no customers; owners allege that members do not have liquidity to afford certain supplies.

Lessons Learned

- Even though businesses were badly affected during this pandemic, farmers were safe because they could sell their products around their communities and had some food left for their home consumption.
- Members cannot afford face masks to protect themselves from the spread of the pandemic.
- Resilience: The demonstrated resilience of these savings groups continues to support the thinking that the formation and support for savings groups is a key response to livelihoods for communities; therefore, continuous support from Hoffman Family Foundation is highly encouraged.
- Formation of semi-small numbered groups among themselves can be made with the monitoring of the group leaders for continuity of group activities.
- Finally, even in a lockdown situation, practicing social distancing guidelines monitoring can be done smoothly.
- Hoffman Family Foundation was able to render support to Sharifah (the blind lady) and Samantha during this period and were able to deliver food items and other home necessities.

Conclusively, no business operation is independent. Each closed activity had a very big effect on economic activities of the members. This has made it so difficult for members to save and repay loans that were acquired from the groups consistently.



FILLING TUMMIES **WARMING HEARTS**

The COVID-19 pandemic has affected our day-to-day life with educational systems put on hold, workers asked to leave work and stay home for unknown periods of time, here we have termed as the dark days of the world. This has been recommended by the World Health Organization and adopted by many countries.

Most governments around the world have temporarily closed all levels of the educational institutions in an attempt to contain the spread of COVID-19. In Uganda approximately 15 million learners are currently affected due to school closures in response to the pandemic. These closures have not only impacted students, teachers and families, but to the far-reaching economic and societal consequences which include: food

insecurity, homelessness, domestic violence amongst families, limited access to health care centers.

The impact is mostly felt by less-advantaged families and children in particular. Most of these elders in the family depend on day-to-day income activities that provide a meal for surviving.

With compassionate hearts, Hoffman Family Foundation embarked on provision of food relief to the affected vulnerable families, community members and staff.

In April, we started our food bank at Rays of Grace Junior School to respond to food shortages of our community. We were honored to provide 1,232 people with over 13,000 pounds



of eggs, posh (maize flour), salt, soap, cooking oil and sugar.

Since government-mandated social distancing prevented the gathering of large crowds, community leaders and area police commanders helped us organize the distribution. We utilized motorcycles to deliver food to our secondary school sponsored children in Kampala.

We are grateful for your tremendous efforts and kindness in serving the Lord through giving to the children of vulnerable families in Uganda. The Hoffman Family Foundation is committed to fully loving and serving the communities and instilling a Legacy of Love.

We have learned that in addition to our food relief disbursement, ongoing efforts are needed. Due to the governmental lockdown extensions, to combat the virus, work loss impact continues.
