A GIFT OF HOPE

om, do you have any extra books or school supplies you could bring to the kids here?" That was the first thing my son, Zane (volunteer coordinator for HFF), asked when I told him I wanted to come meet the people in Kirugu that he talks so much about. Right away, we started planning!

Paper, pencils, crayons, folders, notebooks, rulers, scissors, books, teaching tools, and more paper. These were the school supplies that children at Steven's Elementary school in Jefferson County, Colorado collected to give to the children at Rays of Grace Academy. Even though Stevens is a Title 1 school with high needs themselves, the students here felt pride and joy in being able to give what little they had to the students at Rays of Grace. As it turned out, everybody gave a little, and it became a lot!

With the help of every volunteer in our group heading to Uganda, we were able to transport most of the school supplies in a second suitcase per person that stayed within the airline weight limit. We also distributed some supplies among other volunteers in their one allowed suitcase that were going before or after our trip.

Upon our arrival at the Rays of Grace Academy, we were greeted with open arms, singing children, and beautiful sunshine. It was more than enough to melt everyone's heart! On our third day to the school we handed out the paper and folders to the children and teachers as well as giving the teachers all the rest of the supplies for their classrooms. They were all so thankful and appreciative. We heard "Webale-webale" (thank you, thank you) over and over again. Seeing the big smiles and pure joy on the faces of the students was wonderful! Visiting their classrooms was fun too. The children were so proud and eager to show us where they study. The students take great pride in their new school as we saw them sweeping and cleaning the floors and steps.

Rays of Grace Academy serves 370 students, 151 girls and 219 boys. Of those, 115 are boarding students. There are 26 staff members which include teachers, secretaries, cooks and a nurse. They provide education to 5 years old up to about 15 year olds . Their native language is Lugandan but they all learn English starting in the early ages. The school is solar powered, has two working wells, and is licensed with the Department of Education. They also raise their own chickens and grow their own vegetables. The teachers at Rays of Grace, under the support of head teacher Reagan and head master Charles, hold high expectations for their students. We often heard the children saying they wanted to be a doctor, a lawyer, a teacher or an engineer!

I am so thankful and feel very blessed to have had this opportunity to visit Kirugu and Rays of Grace Academy. As a teacher myself, visiting with the teachers there was inspiring! As they said, "Teachers encourage minds to think, hands to create, and hearts to love. Teachers inspire the hope of today and dreams of tomorrow."











COMMISSIONING "SHERRI'S PLACE"

ur New Sickbay/Nursing Clinic was birth on June 16, 2017. This is a place where our babies can go to receive treatment for illnesses and accidents that may occur at school. Do you remember growing up and going to the school nurse? Robert surprised me the day of the commissioning and let me know that we now have a full-time nurse on staff at our school. That surprise made me cry. Please meet Fiona. She is a beautiful young nurse that just recently graduated nursing school. She told me she is so happy to be serving with us and she promises to take good care of our children.

Earlier that week we were able to test all 370 children to see if they were carrying malaria in their bloodstream. That is one of the main things our children deal with on an ongoing basis. Out of the 370 children we had 145 children that had signs that the malaria virus was affecting their bodies. That day we were able to give them tablets (and suckers to help with the fear of the blood-test) and help them start fighting this awful virus that affects so many of

our children. That same day I happened to check the boys dormitory and found three boys laying on their beds each having 106° temperature because they had malaria. I couldn't believe what I was seeing. I went to get some cold water and some towels and I started cooling them off and praying over each of their sick little bodies. All along knowing that by Friday our sickbay clinic would be open for patients. It couldn't open fast enough especially now since the dormitory has 115 children that stay with us full-time.

We were so blessed with our second volunteer group this summer. They fundraised and brought over medical supplies and lots of medicine that would fill the cabinets of our sickbay clinic. Many parents send their children to school sick because they have no means to provide medical assistance for their own children. Can you even begin to imagine or perceive this? But now we can make sure these precious little souls will have everything they will need when they are ill. Fiona also has direct access to several doctors in Jinja

Please remember to keep Fiona temperature because they had malaria. I lifted in prayer as she takes care of these precious babies each day.

I would like to thank the "Brake" Family for helping us raise \$3800 which allowed us to furnish the sickbay clinic with our initial start up. In February they lost their dear wife, mother and friend to cancer, but now her beautiful legacy lives on in "Rays of Grace" in the hearts of all our students in Kirugu, Uganda.

Our children are stronger than they know.. braver than they think... And loved more than they can imagine. And I know out of their suffering they have emerged as some of the strongest souls I have ever seen.

Our small town of Gunnison raised money to buy Jane a car, purchase uniforms for children so they could attend school and buy goats for several widows. Jane came to see me in 2009 and we went to Gunnsion where she spoke to our church and they asked what would be most helpful to her and she said for these women to own property then they can be

ow to Him who is able to do independent and feel like they are to watch her speak so lovingly and somebody, so we began to buy more goats and cows to help these women to become independent. Woman of Purpose now has 301 cows and over 200 goats and chickens as well.

> When my sister Lori asked if I wanted to go with her to Uganda to see where Zane, her son has spent the past three summers I said YES! I never imagined it could really happen! Uganda is such a beautiful country and the people are true treasures! I was blessed to go with the Hoffman Family Foundation who have huge hearts for the people of Uganda, particularly an incredible school full of children and leaders called, "Rays of Grace" in Kirugu.

> They also have a Women's Empowerment program, which I was so interested in. They have given micro loans to groups of women to begin businesses. We were able to meet with the women and see some of the ways they have risen their living by opening their own business. We met Margaret who owns her own Hair salon. Mama Marion who has her own store which is a meeting place for friends in the community as well as providing a place to purchase necessities.

> My friend Jane Opolot came to Kirugu to speak to the women and to encourage them. It was such an honor

powerfully to theses women who had gathered in the community center. We then visited incredible gardens; corn is bigger than I have ever seen! Sharon has a huge field of full of tomatoes! Esther owns and cares for cows, pigs, chickens and a very pregnant goat! Before we left Uganda we heard the goat had 4 kids!

I came home empowered as I have seen how very hard the women in Kirugu and surrounding areas work to provide for their families. Many have paid back their micro loans and now are able to encourage others by loaning money to more women for their businesses. We got to visit a group of women who make bricks and they showed us the process of making them from the red clay dirt. We sat under beautiful tents and on chairs that another group rents out for profit. We visited Helen and her store in Jinga at the source of the Nile and many purchased beautiful items from her. Tami Hoffman in her generous way purchased beautiful mats from a woman who came prepared to our women's meeting, to encourage her and bless us as she gifted each of us with a mat. At home my mat is a treasured reminder of possibility! God's Hand, our willing hearts and hard work!

I am blessed beyond measure, and this trip was a huge gift to my heart!!



On harvesting, most of the produce is consumed and a little is sold to pay for the children's education. Unfortunately, income from the sale of farm produce cannot sustain the needs including; education, health, clothing and utilities. Nestroy studies at Rays of Grace but his future at the school is uncertain given the fact that his parents do not have any hope of raising fees for next term.

Lawrence is the third in a family of four children. He joined Rays of Grace this year in Baby Class. His father, David Sendegeya, was a very hard working and committed parent of Rays of Grace before he got involved in a terrible accident early this year that led to memory loss; he might not be able to work again. Lawrence's mother (Prossy Nakato) has a small retail shop in Namiyagi village. Income from the shop is not enough to cater for home needs, children's school fees and the intense medical care for David.



OUR NEXT PROJECT

Would you consider partnering with HFF to buy a school bus?

Our newest project is to purchase a used bus that will transport our kids that still walk several hours to get to school. We would like to be able to help transport these kids to and from school. This helps to protect our kids from the many adverse conditions that force them to abandon their pursuit of education. This bus will be used also for the many new sports activities that we have recently joined with other schools.

This year we contracted with a bus company that transported all of our HFF volunteers from May 18th to July 1st. This bus will also be used for this function when our next volunteer groups arrive. Which will save US dollars that can be used elsewhere.

We should be able to buy a used bus for approximately \$25,000.
